

COHOCTAH M-11

The second part of the party

Deputy Surveyor John Mullett set a wood post to first mark this standard corner on April 11th, 1823.

Information furnished us by Mr. C.E. Garlock indicate that Pat Benton's records show this as a 1/2" iron rerod per Boss Job No. 9649. This information is apparently the same as recorded on LSC 389 by Boss in 1972 although Benton provides some additional ties.

On October 19, 1933, the fieldcrew recovered a 1/2" Iron rerod at this location. To determine whether the iron found was the standard or closing corner we compared bearings and distances along the northline of the section as surveyed for this report with the same noted on Boss '78.

Additionally, a closed traverse was run around the South 1/2 of Section 30 of Deerfield Township, the township adjoining on the East. In that section and Section 31 immediately to the South there are a number of recorded surveys by Boss Engineering from which were prepared in such a way that the location of missing closing corners A-11 and A-10 can be computed. Neither computed location falls on the line between the standard corners; A-10 falls 6.67 Feet East of line M-11 to M-10, while corner A-11 falls 11.57 Feet West of line M-11 to closing corner A-12. The offset between the computed location of closing corner A-10 and standard corner M-10, however, checks within 0.02 Feet of the distance implied on the GLO plat. The offset at M-11 relative to the computed location of closing corner A-11 measures 8.78 Feet longer than the distance recorded on the GLO plat.

Finally, we extended our traverse to the E 1/4 corner and the NE corner of Section 25 of Cohoctah Township. This latter point, corner M-9 of Cohoctah Township, was recovered as a brass State of Michigan monument. Its complementing closing corner, corner A-9 of Deerfield Township lies 11.28 Feet South of this corner and 0.01 Feet West of the line M-9 to M-10. Here, a 3/4" Iron was recovered. The offset between standard corner M-9 and closing corner A-9 checks the GLO plat distance within 0.06 Feet. Additionally, the distances from corner M-10 to corners M-9 checks within 0.23 Feet of the same line as measured by Desine'93.

As a result of the above supplementary traverse, we conclude that the iron found is the standard corner.

The land on either side of this corner is somewhat swampy, thus, no occupation was noted. The corner falls on the East edge of a gravel road, approximately 12' off the centerline. Additionally, at least two witnesses recovered that day can be traced back to Benton's records.

The distance from this corner to quarter corner L-11 is 0.71' shorter than the same distance noted on surveys by Boss'78. With respect to corner M-12 lying a half-mile south, no recorded distance for the length of this line could be found on the public record despite numerous surveys in sections lying east of the townline. A survey by Desine in '93 failed to locate any of the standard and closing corners along this range line except for corners M-13 and M-10, finding them to be 7955.04 Feet apart, a distance we checked within 0.12 Feet.

We could find no physical indication of closing corner A-11 for T4N-R5E, which, according to the GLO plat, falls 14 links South of the standard corner. Its computed location is as cited in the paragraphs above.
