

SECTION

I, Joseph C. Domitrovich, in a field survey on December 7, 1998, do hereby state that under requirements of P.A. 74, Michigan P.A. of 1970, the corner points mentioned in lines 1 and 2 above were in conformance with regulations and rules therefore as required in the current manual of survey instructions of the United States Department of the Interior, Bureau of Land Management or by a decree of a Court of Law and /or that the corner points mentioned in lines 3, 4 and 5 above were in conformance with the rules of the Michigan Board of Land Surveyors or by a Decree of a Court of Law; established, re-established, monumented, recovered, found as expressed below:

A. Description of original monument and accessories and/or subsequent restoration: (J-11) - 1/2 Corner Common to section 26 and 35, T51N, R39W

1845 - Austin Burt set a birch post

18" Hemlock S52°W 43 links N31°E 8" Sugar 37 links

1980 - Mead Corporation records indicate that there was an iron pipe at this corner.

B. Description of corner evidence found and/or method applied in restoring or reestablishing corner:

I found no remains of the original corner or accessories. The area Southwest of the corner is now a cleared field. I found a 11/2" iron pine at the intersection of the extension of old fencelines to the West, East and South. Distances to Section Corners to the East and West are considerably shorter and longer than GLO. I spoke with Mr. Francis Dahl, a lifelong resident of the area. He told me that his father began farming the area south of this Corner in 1915. His father put up the fences in the 1920's, at the same time that a county road was built along the West 1/16 line of this section. He stated that the fence intersection at the corner of his field has always been the accepted position of the 1/4 Corner. To put the corner at a split of the distances between corners would put it over 35 feet into the field and would disrupt the 1/16 fences and the road built along 1/16 lines.

Because of longtime usage and acceptance, I have accepted the pipe at the fence intersection as the 1/4 corner.

C. Description of monument for corner and accessories established to perpetuate locating the position of the corner.

Corner is a 5/8" x 48" iron pin driven into the existing 1/14" iron pipe with a 3" diameter aluminum cap stamped to read: County Remonumentation; T.51N., R.39W.; 1/4; S.26, S.35; 1998; P.S. 37273.
